Affordable eyecare

The cost of living is challenging all of us at the moment but amongst our priorities should be our eyesight. Ignoring any issues or problems with our eyesight could put our vision at risk and cause further deterioration of any conditions we may be facing.

Vision loss usually occurs gradually and painlessly, and most people don't notice until after the damage has been done. Putting off eye care increases the risk for undetected or uncontrolled eve conditions. eye damage, and vision loss, especially from glaucoma.

One type of eye stroke occurs when blood flow leaving the retina (the light-sensing component in the back of the eye) is disrupted. It can cause temporary or permanent vision loss. People with high blood pressure, diabetes, glaucoma, and cardiovascular disease are at greater risk for this condition.

Diabetic retinopathy. Diabetes can cause blood vessels in the retina to become "leaky," leading to temporary vision loss. "Sometimes the blood will clear on its own. If it doesn't, you may need surgery. If the old blood or new blood vessels block the drain in your eye, you can get increased eye pressure and glaucoma," Dr. Shen says.

Age-related macular degeneration. This condition gradually destroys the macula, the retina's central portion. It's the part of the eye that provides central vision needed for seeing objects clearly.

With yearly eye exams, patients are able to get prescriptions that are up to date. Having an eye prescription suited to your eyes now and not your eyes a year ago means fewer headaches and reduced eye strain.

Heartfelt thank you to Incal studies volunteers

Hard working local studies volunteers received a personal thank you from the Civic Mayor of Tameside, Cllr Tafheen Sharif, at a celebratory event held at the archives centre on Cotton Street, Ashton.

Over the current financial year, more than 3.000 hours have been volunteered across Tameside Cultural Services - which also includes museums, galleries, arts and engagement – with almost half purely within local studies. Accompanied by Cllr Sangita Patel, the council's assistant executive member for culture, heritage and digital inclusivity, the Mayor heard all about the vital work the volunteers do.

This includes cleaning the Stamford Estate plans, military research, listing new accessions, staffing family history help desks, and cataloguing and researching the Tameside Reporter's vast photographic archive as part of the Smile project. Members of Tameside Local History Forum were also present. Volunteer Stephanie Shakeshaft got curious after her father passed away not knowing anything about the Archive. She said: "So the volunteer who helped me when I came left, and I took over when he left to join as a volunteer. There's lots of reasons why people visit the archive, they may not





know about their parents but have heard stories over the years but haven't a clue how to research it. So, I've been helping people here now for over 12 years." Another volunteer with expertise in military research is Phil Handley who said: "If anybody has got any medals, I would do the research to find out about them so they can discover the story behind them. Today I've brought some medals I have collected from Richard Francis Poole, an Officer in The Cheshire Regiment World War 1 including the Military Cross and French legion D'Honor. After the First World war he joined The Royal Engineers and eventually became a Lieutenant Colonel receiving the OBE in 1940 and then in 1945 he received

the CBE. I've been collecting medals for over 50 years and if people are curious to discover if any of their family have been decorated perhaps a first stop is to check the records of The Gazette - www. thegazette.co.uk/all-notices/content/ national-record-of-achievement."

Cllr Patel and the Mayor also saw items from the local studies and archives collection such as posters, plans, pictures and letters. The Mayor said: "We couldn't do what we do without our wonderful volunteers. By continuing to give and give they keep Tameside going. I want them to know their work is hugely appreciated and to thank each and every one of them. "It was also pleasing to see some young people involved as they will keep things going. That's very important as history tells us who we are and where we have come from. These are all things that need to be available to new generations as they grow and learn." Cllr Patel added: "I really enjoyed talking to the volunteers and I would like to thank them for the superb job they do. "Their work is carried out with passion and pride, and they are a great asset to the borough and its heritage. Thanks to their dedication and commitment, Tameside's story will be available to the people of the future." 

She had previously knitted dozens of knitted character 'Teds'- some inspired by Denton's history and heritage such as a Boy Scout, the chairman of the town council and a proud citizen carrying a poppy wreath. While self-isolating during the COVID pandemic, she made 'key worker' bears including a police officer, bus driver, doctor and paramedic.

On a sunny afternoon in early March, Denton Inner Wheel president Kathleen





Walker and other members met for the official unveiling of Florence's latest creation and were clearly delighted.

The organisation was formed by Mrs Margarette Golding at a meeting at the social club in Lower Mosley Street, Manchester on 10th January 1924.

The Denton club started in 1947 and at its height in the 1990s had 35 members. Kathleen told us about the work of the organisation supporting many local charities such as food banks, hospices and women's refuge. "This year BEAT (eating disorders) is our national charity, and we are also supporting Blood Bikes".

International causes are also helped such as Shelter Box, Mary's Meals, as well as aid for the citizens of war-torn Ukraine and earthquake zones. "Our aim is friendship and service here and around the world".

Members from Denton are looking forward to joining 1,000 women from all around the world who will be attending the Inner Wheel official centenary celebration at the Central Convention Centre in Manchester over three days at the beginning of May.



Bollywood theme for Mayor's charity ball

Bollywood came to Tameside for the Civic Mayor's charity ball at Dukinfield Town Hall on Saturday, March 2nd.

Entertainment was provided by the multi-award-winning Ri Ri's Dance Academy; Dhol Drummers and pioneer of UK Bhangra music, loga Singh; and the menu featured authentic Indian food (including vegetarian option) as well as a more traditional choice.

The Civic Mayor of Tameside, Cllr Tafheen Sharif, said: "Bringing Tameside's communities together is something that means a great deal to me."

The event raised over £9000 for The Civic Mayor's charity appeal fund that comprises Home-Start (HOST), which offers expert support to families with young children that are going through difficult times; West African Development, which helps ethnic minority communities in Tameside, and Pauline Town's We Shall Overcome, which provides assistance for the homeless.















Tameside (a) 50

On the 1st of April 1974, local Government had a huge shake up when nine towns - Ashton, Audenshaw, Denton, Droylsden, Dukinfield, Hyde, Longdendale, Mossley and Stalybridge came under the administration of Metropolitan Borough of Tameside and became part of the new Greater Manchester County Council.

The total population at that time was 223,000, and the council planned to employ 9.000 members of staff, comparing it to today 2,798 staff look after a population of 219,000. On the Sunday before, Stalybridge Mayor, Councillor Arthur Dugdale, led a procession of the departing council from the Town Hall to the Parish Church, on a lovely spring day. The Ashton Mayor, Alderman Ernest Jones, wrote a farewell message of appreciation for the service given over the years to the people of the town.

The first Mayor of Tameside was Councillor James Eason of Ashton and his wife Lena, Mayoress, were presented with a Royal Assent from Queen Elizabeth II, for Tameside to be a borough, it was printed on vellum with a large seal attached

to it by red and yellow silk cord. The deputy Mayor was Councillor John Porter of Stalybridge, with his wife Lily as deputy Mayoress.

Each of the towns had a central information centre to help with the changes on the day of opening. This was to help with the changes to rent, rent books, house repairs and an assortment of other queries, which were all passed onto the relevant Tameside departments. An eight-

page civic newspaper was published along with an information brochure to help people with the change. A trendy T-shaped symbol was chosen to identify the district with a colour scheme of Kingfisher blue and brown. The new Tameside Administrative Complex in Ashton did not open until

Tameside at 50: Centre for Tameside

Tameside Administrative Centre (TAC) was opened in 1981 when all the individual town councils of Tameside were brought together under one roof.

It was constructed by a new method at the time using pre-cast concrete sections, which cut building time but allowed for a traditional and attractive brick finish. The complex was triangular, and the highest part was the eight storey tower block, the remainder of the building was three and five storeys high. The total cost of the build was f11 million.

The main entrance was on Wellington Road with a reception desk to direct people to the appropriate departments, there was also a cash office and information desk. However, another entrance was created on the Market Ground which was more convenient for the public to access.


Space on the ground floor was allocated for a superstore which was taken by Wilkinsons who also moved into the new building until the chain closed its stores in 2023.

On the first floor was the administration department along with planning and personnel. On the second floor were the Education department as well as Libraries, Estates and Social Services. On the third floor was the Chief Executive, Architects, Environmental Health and Building Services and Housing Departments. The fourth floor was Finance, fifth floor Engineers and the top floors were taken up with IT.

The catering department and staff restaurant were also situated on the first floor providing meals at lunchtime and catering in the evening when the Town Hall held

Replacing the ageing Council administrative building, which was too large, no longer fit for purpose and too expensive to run, with a smaller building incorporating the latest energy-saving technology and shared with partners, was also a decision to save taxpayers money.

You can look back at many other aspects of Tameside history in old newspapers which are accessible at Tameside Local Studies & Archive Centre, on Cotton Street East, Ashton, where it will remain as it will not be moving into Tameside One. Tameside at 50: Maintaining a tradition

- Since Tameside was formed in 1974 the borough has had a Civic Mayor. The Civic Mayor and Deputy Mayor are elected by the Council annually. The Civic Mayor has the following responsibilities:-
- 1. to uphold and promote the purposes of the Constitution, and to interpret the Constitution when necessary;
- 2. to promote public involvement in the Council's activities:
- 3. to be the conscience of the Council:
- 4. as the first citizen of Tameside to deal with his/ her ambassadorial role both inside and outside the Borough;
- 5. to chair Civic Council meetings including a mid term Civic Council Meeting to present the State of the Borough address in relation to his/her duties:
- 6. together with the members of the Civic Panel, to market Tameside in a positive manner; and
- 7. to attend such civic and ceremonial functions as the Council or (s)he determines appropriate.
- 8. The Civic Mayor, and in his/her absence, the Deputy Mayor, preside over the first and opening part of each Council meeting.

Together with the traditional ceremonial robes and chains of office the Civic Mayor is also custodian of the mace.

The ceremonial mace was used early as a symbol of authority of military commanders. Today the mace is used mainly as a ceremonial object. It has become the Mayor's symbol of Authority. It is used by The Civic Mayor of Tameside Metropolitan Borough Council, on all major and civic/ceremonial events throughout the Borough and beyond. Although, since the 1st April 1974 the Council has the possible use of several maces which were acquired through the formation of the Metropolitan Borough of Tameside, the Hyde Corporation Mace is used. This being the most ornate and decorative of the maces possessed.

Tameside at 50: Facts

Ashton Market Hall caught fire on the 25th May 2004 completely devastating the interior and displacing the businesses within. With the outside structure intact work commenced to bring the market hall back from the ashes. After being housed in the temporary Phoenix Market Hall on Old Cross Street car park Ashton Market Hall re-opened in 2008.

The M60 is the only orbital motorway in Britain (the M25 is part dual carriageway at Dartford Bridge and tunnel). It began with the construction of the Western Stretford Eccles bypass in 1958 and took over forty years to complete the circle with Denton West in 1989 until the opening of the Middleton-Denton Eastern finished the section in 2000.

In February 2018, Denton Councillor Brenda Warrington became the first woman **Executive Leader of Tameside** Council following the untimely death of her predecessor Councillor Kieran Quinn in December 2017. She remained as council leader until May 2022 steering the council through the challenges of completing the Tameside One project and the Covid Pandemic.

John Schlesinger's film Yanks starring Richard Gere was filmed in Tameside in 1978 using familiar landmarks including Stalybridge town centre, Stamford Golf Club and St Paul's Church, as well as Hyde Town Hall.

Leigh Drennan has made history a couple of times in Tameside, he was elected aged just 20 in 2012, and also became the youngest councillor to serve as the borough's Mayor in 2019-20.In taking on the role, he also became Tameside's first openly-LGBT+ civic mayor, with partner Cory James by his side as consort.

Tameside has had a strong relationship with television drama over the years featuring in programmes like Coronation Street, Jossy's Giants, Making Out and Band Of Gold. More recently we have had programmes like Scott & Bailey, Cobra, Ridley Road, Stay Close, The Full Monty, Brassic and detective drama Ridley.

In February 2013 the Manchester to Droylsden to Metrolink line opened and in October that year the Ashton section of the Metrolink opened completing the Ashton route to the Manchester town centre after years of work.

Councillor Roy Oldham, who passed away in 2010, was the longest serving Executive Leader of Tameside Councillor from 1980 until 2010. He was a founder member of the Association of Greater Manchester Authorities, following the dissolution of the Greater Manchester county council in 1986, and went on to chair the board of Manchester international airport, which is owned by the 10 Greater Manchester authorities. He also chaired and led the Greater Manchester pension fund for 23


The name 'Tameside' was chosen because of the River Tame which helped power the industrial revolution two centuries ago.

Following the demolition of TAC (Tameside Administrative Centre) which had been the hub of council offices since 1980, the new Tameside One complex featuring council facilities, new library and Tameside College opened in March 2019.

Mossley Councillor Tafheen Sharif is the first Muslim and ethnic minority person to be appointed civic mayor of Tameside since the borough was created on April 1, 1974.

Clarendon Mall Hyde

In the early 18th century, the area where Hyde was born was largely agricultural, with small hamlets, the largest being Gee Cross village, at the base of Werneth Low. Owing to the availability of good local water sources, along with rapid advances in the spinning industry, it was an attractive place for entrepreneurs of the time to build large mill buildings, to process the wool, at first from local farms.

The industry was also fuelled by imports from the expanding British Empire in Georgian, then early Victorian times. The building of the Peak Forest Canal made the movement of raw materials and products easier before roads and road vehicles had been improved. The railways in the mid nineteenth century also contributed to the growing wealth of those who invested in the mills. Along with the mills, housing was created for the workers, along with shops and public houses, many of which started as private houses selling alcohol. Several of the Mill owners saw the benefits of contributing to the development of things beneficial to creating a sense of community and physical statements to instil a sense of pride. In the mid 19th century, what became Hyde town centre, was the site of a couple of large mills, one being Greenfield Mill. One important ingredient in the production process was a store of water, in the form of a reservoir, which prior to 1850, could be found on what became the Market Square.

In 1881 Hyde was officially incorporated as a town, with the town





hall building we have today was created. By this time the reservoir had been filled in, allowing what had become a market space to expand and become a regular feature of the town, drawing traders from further afield as transport links improved. Trams were added as the 19th century came to a close. Clarendon Street and Clarendon Place was the main shopping thoroughfare, where grand buildings housed shops for everything people required. The market square was filled with wooden huts, for the small independent trades to do

By the 1950s these had been replaced by market stalls, but the square was bordered on one side still by roads filled with terraced housing, which had deteriorated in condition. In the early 1960s Cheshire County Council, along with the then Hyde Council, took the decision to redevelop the area adjacent to the Market Square. A partnership with a private developer saw the construction of the Clarendon Shopping Precinct, which opened in 1967. One of the first businesses was owned by Mike King, as the Chicken, Bacon & Cheese Shop (now Hot Food Kitchen), another was Erik Kirsh, the jeweller. The new building also housed an indoor market and part of the outdoor market also spread into the newly created structure, but in an area that had no roof. In 1994 a major development took place, which included putting a roof over the area,



which wasn't originally covered, but market traders in that part were not allowed back into that area. The Mall had changed ownership several times, with the latest owner taking control in November 2023.

The Indoor Market and outdoor one on the Market Square are still owned by Tameside Council, who manage and let the stalls. Despite losing many of its big-name stores, the Mall is now home to an NHS Health Hub. Several small independent businesses have opened, with a new coffee shop opening this month. Hyde has suffered over the years, like similar mill and market towns, who have had to adapt to a changing world. Hopefully it can find a new purpose to thrive once again.

Fight to save church

The fight is on to save Ashton's historic church with two spires. St lames' on Cowhill Lane has been a focal point for the area around Penny Meadow for 160 years, but sadly, like many other churches has struggled to survive in the 21st Century.

Attendances on Sundays have dwindled to an all-time

low while running costs have soared. Last year the Church of England asked the five churches in the Good Shepherd parish to decide which could be closed. Faced with a difficult choice, representatives voted that it should be St lames'. A consultation process is now underway giving parishioners, local councillors and community groups the opportunity to voice their objections. More than 70 people attended a public meeting in the church on March 11 and the C of E Manchester Diocese will consider the views expressed before a final decision is made.

Ashton St Michael's ward councillors Bill Fairfoull, Jean Drennan and Andrew McLaren have written to the Bishop of Manchester expressing concern that an area of "high deprivation" stands to lose one of its most precious assets. They describe St James' as not only a place of worship and familiar landmark on the Ashton skyline but also an important community hub with uniformed organisations for children and teenagers. local education classes and support groups. "It will leave a school without a place of worship, the community without a space to meet and if left mothballed will



inevitably attract anti-social behaviour and vandalism in already a challenging area." Churchwarden Tina Howarth believes St James' should be seen as more than just the regular Sunday worshippers. "There is so much more footfall during the week. "The Scout group which started in 1908 is the oldest in the district and currently has Beavers, Cubs, Scouts and Explorers. It would be a great loss if this was to close." She added that St James' School next to the church has over 200 pupils who come into church on a regular basis. Built in 1863, Grade Two listed St James' is the only church within the old Lancashire boundary which has two spires, attracting visitors from far and wide, especially during the ever popular Heritage Open Days held each September. Other recent events have been well supported by the local community including a rock'n'roll nostalgia show, a Christmas brass concert and a three-day scarecrow festival.


Markets Move

fruit bowl, such as apples, pears, apricots, plums etc. I've used apples as they are always hanging about in my fruit bowl, but experiment with other fruits such as apricots, rhubarb, gooseberries, plums, nectarines, bananas or blackberries, raspberries or strawberries.

Ingredients

- 1759 soft butter or margarine
- 1759 soft brown sugar
- 1259 self-raising flour
- 50g coconut or ground almond
- 2 grated apples or

other fruit (roughly chop if soft fruit)

- · Zest of I orange
- · 2 large eggs, lightly beaten
- · Icing sugar to dust



Put the butter and sugar in a bowl and beat until smooth. Gradually add the eggs beating between each addition. Sieve the flour and fold into the mixture with the coconut or ground almonds, orange zest and chopped fruit.



Preheat the oven to 180((350F) gas mark 4. Put the sweetie paper cups into a 'cocktail' tin. Fill them two-thirds full with the cake mixture. Place a few chopped fruits on the top. Dust with icing sugar and cook for 10-15 minutes.

Put onto a wire rack to cool.

To freeze ahead: (omplete this recipe up to cool, then pack, label and freeze for up to 3 months. To use: Pefrost overnight and warm in low oven for a few minutes to freshen up.













ON THE DRIVER'S SIDE

Motoring tips from Guide Bridge MOT & Service

Motoring in the UK requires drivers to meet a variety of rules and regulations - but what happens when a manufacturer discovers an issue with your vehicle?

What is a vehicle safety recall? A vehicle recall happens when a manufacturer identifies an issue with a particular make or model of vehicle - sometimes they affect a small number of vehicles, and sometimes it's a much wider range depending on

While there are some instances that will cause owners concern - such as the Vauxhall Zafira fires or Toyota and Lexus airbags, for the most part recalls are for smaller fixes to ensure reliability or, in the case of the VW emissions scandal. create compliance with emissions regulations.

How can I be made aware of a recall? After determining what needs recalling, the manufacturer registers the issue with the DVSA, who then authorise the DVLA to provide contact details of all current owners.

From these, manufacturers can then write, email or call vehicle owners to make them aware of an outstanding recall on their vehicle and advise them on how to proceed.

What if I want to check for a recall myself? The DVSA website has a function where motorists can check their car's MOT history, and they have now added a "Recall Checker" function to their service. All you need is the vehicle registration - test it out at https://www.check- mot.service.gov.uk/.

If there is an outstanding recall on the vehicle you are searching for the information below will be provided and you will be advised to contact your nearest dealership to conduct an assessment.

If there's a recall for my vehicle what do I do? You can book in an appointment with the manufacturer franchised dealer of your choice – just tell them you need an appointment for a recall and provide them with your vehicle's details at a time convenient for you.

Depending on the severity of the recall, your car could be back to you within five minutes or across the span of several hours, but your chosen garage should be able to advise you on an approximate timescale so you can plan accordingly.

What happens if I don't fix the issue? There is currently no legal mandate for owners to have recalls resolved. but the DVSA has been discussing the option of including vehicle recall checks as part of the mandatory annual MOT, with failures for vehicles that are subject to outstanding recalls that haven't been addressed.

Owners are also responsible for the condition of their vehicle and can be subject to fines and the invalidation of their insurance if found to be driving a vehicle in a dangerous condition.

What can I do about general maintenance for my car? If you want a reputable, local, independent garage operating to a Chartered **Trading Standards Institute** (CTSI)-approved Code of Conduct, you can use the Trust My Garage website or visit Guide Bridge MOT & Service. Call them on 0161 339 5354 for all your motoring needs.



months of the year, there are plenty of other jobs to do just now to keep you warm and active. For one thing the nutrition left in the soil from last autumn has been washed away by winter rains, so to keep your plants healthy it is essential to provide food, now is the time to start adding compost from last year, or a great all-rounder of pelleted poultry manure which can easily be bought from the more cheaper shops.

Weeds love this just as much, so don't let them take hold, digging them out now while they are young and keeping on top of it every week will save back breaking work in the summer months when they'll root deep and spread. If you are not using an area, then clear it and cover with black plastic until you need to plant again.

We have just experienced a very mild winter in Tameside. Slugs and snails will have enjoyed this as well and will now be starting to benefit from the new growth on your plants. Don't assume that because you don't see them that they are not there. They are, they are just hiding during the day and come out at night to feast. There are many ways to control slugs, from pellets to

barriers, whichever you favour it's time to do it. Time to consider sowing our veg, with early sowings of onions, parsnips and broad beans direct into the garden. Broad beans and peas that have been sown in pots in the greenhouse or frame should be hardened off now before planting out. Towards the end of the month carrots. turnips, radish and even lettuce can be sown. Now is also a good time to begin forcing tender shoots of rhubarb, just place a bucket over them and wait a few weeks. If you have not planted your potatoes because you had scab last year, then try putting grass cuttings under your tuber when planting, this will reduce the alkaline in your soil that causes the scabbing.

Now if the weather is fine. we can expect late winter and early spring flowers like Camellia, Rhododendrons, Chaenomeles, Corylopsis, Daphne, not to mention Forsythia, Magnolia, Mahonia and Viburnums which will now come into life bring a grand display of colour throughout the coming months. Cuttings can be taken of some plants such as Delphiniums, Phlox, Lupins and Penstemons. These cuttings will need the protection of a glasshouse or frame until the better : weather arrives.

One problem pet owners face constantly is keeping the house clean and tidy so here are a few tips which may help.

It sounds obvious, but dirt removed through grooming is dirt not lying around the house. While you shouldn't use pet shampoo too often, a quick wash down



with plain water can make a world of difference. Keep damp dogs confined to one area, preferably with an easy to clean floor e.g. laundry room, kitchen. Better yet thoroughly dry them afterwards to avoid any eau de wet dog.

The wrong material on your sofa can act like a hair magnet, hold undesirable odours and show up the slightest stain. While scouting your new sofa, look for leather or tightly woven materials, ideally in a similar shade to your pets. If you can't spring for a new sofa, add a pet friendly throw which can be chucked in the wash when needed.

Consider the type of flooring you have in your home when buying a vacuum and if your pet goes on the furniture, look for one which can tackle upholstery too. If you've got yourself a shedder, you'll need to vacuum daily to keep on top of things.

Pet beds, toys and even leads pick up that strong dog odour and all need to be cleaned regularly. Check if they are machine washable, otherwise you can wash by hand in the sink.

Want to de-fuzz a carpet or de-fur a sofa? Put on a pair of dishwashing gloves and sweep the area with your hands. The fur instantly sticks to the rubber nubs at the fingertips. Once you're done, dip the gloves in water, and allow the fur to float to the surface. Then gather it and toss it in the rubbish. Ever let your furry friend climb into bed with you? Eliminate odours from bed covers by adding a cup of bicarb soda to your load. Then launder as normal – on a hot cycle with a mild detergent that won't irritate your pet. Collars can start to smell pretty funky pretty quickly, what with everything your pet gets up to. Soak them in very hot water with a few squirts of dog shampoo. Leave for 15 minutes, and then rub against itself to extract dirt before patting with a towel and placing in the sun to dry. Persistent pet smells

Our local police are often out in the community spreading the message about various crime prevention ideas as well as providing their expertise and knowledge to try to prevent criminal activities.

Several years ago, one such extremely popular crime prevention scheme was the huge giveaway of several hundred purse bells.

Shoppers formed long queues at two temporary stalls outside the market hall to receive what was at the time, the latest crime prevention innovation. The simple, but highly effective, bells had a fastener that clipped on to a purse, wallet or handbag providing an audible deterrent to any pickpockets who were



attempting purse dipping or handbag snatching.

The bells were a huge success and were all snapped up in

the day-long promotion. Local police officers and PCSO's explained how they worked, showing how quick and easy they were to attach with their small clips and that if the purse was moved, the bells would jingle and alert the owner.

The bells, which were the most popular items on the day were given out alongside ultraviolet pens, timers





switches for houselights and various leaflets about crime prevention and bogus callers.

For months after the promotion, in various shops and at market stalls you could clearly hear the jingle of those bells at shop counters and I'm sure today many people still have their purse bells, and they continue to be a deterrent.
