

Tameside Council has been working closely with the Heritage Fund to unlock the potential of these heritage gems. With strong foundations and bold ambition,


Tameside is poised to transform its heritage into a powerful driver of place-making and prosperity.

# "A loss no victory can replace"

First part of our feature on some of the Men and Women with Connections to Dukinfield who gave their lives in W.W.2.

104 men and 2 women, 82 of whom are listed on the main memorial in Dukinfield, on Chapel Hill, were killed in action or died of their wounds between 1939 and 1945. I in 3 were under the age of 22. All the Services are represented, Army, Royal Navy, RAF, as well as the Merchant Navy and the A. T. S.

Corporal William Lainton, 2nd Battalion Lancashire Fusiliers was killed and buried in Sicily in the Argenta Gap War Cemetery. His two brothers also served and survived. He was a St Mary's schoolboy and had started work at Daniel Adamson's.

James Bowers, who had lived on Wharf Street was a gunner in the 2nd Field Regiment, Royal Artillery. He died age 20, on May 31st, 1940, from a wound received during the retreat from France. He is buried in Dukinfield cemetery (Section B5, grave 809).

(Section 2a grave 68a) In Dukinfield cemetery is the grave of Private William Jones, who was one of the 3.000 men killed from the Royal Army Medical Core. These were medical men, doctors and nurses who supported the British army in every theatre of war. He was 35 when he died so near to the end of the war in Europe in March 1945.

They are just three of the 64 army men from this town killed in action.

Lives were lost at sea, 9 from the Royal Navy, 3 in Merchant Navy ships and several died whilst being

transported by sea.

Able Seaman, Joseph Travis had been in the Navy for 5 years. He had lived with his mother on Thorncliffe Ave and had attended Globe Lane Primary, Crescent Rd Secondary and Hyde Technical School. He was aboard HMS Galatea with another Dukinfield man, Able Seaman, Edwin Rooth, when she was attacked and sunk in the Mediterranean Sea, with two torpedoes from U boat 557. 470 men died that day, Dec 14th, 1941, 144 survived but Joseph and Edwin were not among them.

Another Royal Navy man, Ordinary seaman, Clarence Hadfield had the misfortune to die in an air raid in Denton, on Dec 23rd ,1940, whilst on leave from H.M.S. Queen Elizabeth. His parents lived in Bush St, Dukinfield.

Two prisoners of war, Aircraftman Robert Carroll of the 211 squadron, R.A.F. Volunteer Reserve and Trooper Water Turner, 3rd King's Own Hussars were killed whilst being transported in a Japanese troop ship which sank.

Sergeant Peter Lowe, aged 20 died 18th August 1943 aged 20. He was a wireless operator and air gunner seconded to the Royal Australian Air Force Squadron. He is buried in Berlin 1939-1945 war cemetery.

# SUPPORTING CHILDREN IN NEED

Back in 1985 when the Blackpool Doctor Who Exhibition closed its doors a group of friends that had met at the venue vowed to stay in touch. From that moment they talked about possibly dressing up and raising money for charity around Tameside initially. So that was the spark that started Hyde Fundraisers and the charity that all the volunteers agreed to support at the time was the BBC's Children in Need Appeal.

Joining several of the live broadcasts over the years the group made various presentations that began with a couple of hundred pounds to the highest amount presented reaching £15,000. Of course, over the past ten years or so the group have donated to many other worthwhile causes but have still consistently donated to Children in Need every year — even during Covid with an online fundraiser titled Trial Revisited. That particular promotion took a behind the scenes look at the groups Trial of Davros shows that took place in 1993 and 2005 presented by voice of K-9, John Leeson.

The association with BBC Children in Need has always strengthened the groups links with the Doctor Who Production office and lead to visits to BBC Dr Who exhibitions along with involvement in various ty appearances.

This months BBC Children in Appeal will be taking place on Friday 14th November.







- I tosp sunflower oil, plus extra for brushing

Tip the carrot and onion mixture into a large 2-litre ovenproof dish. Put the pan back over high heat. Fry the lamb meatballs, turning, until golden on the outside. Put the meatballs into the ovenproof dish. Pour over the gravy and tuck in the bay leaves and thyme sprigs.
- •Thinly slice the cooled potatoes and arrange over the top of the meatballs. Brush the potato with I-2 tsp oil and add a good grinding of black pepper. Bake in the oven for 20-25 mins until the potatoes are tender and starting to become crisp at the edges, and the gravy is bubbling.

The success of the provision is down to the dedication and expertise of the staff team, who bring a wealth of experience and a genuine passion for supporting children with additional needs. Ongoing professional learning ensures



staff remain up to date with the latest research and best practice in SEND education.

Parents are already seeing the difference. Danielle Lewis, parent of Eli, said: "My son is happy, and the staff are incredibly supportive. They understand his needs and are non-judgemental, which means so much to a SEND parent."

Academy Principal, Zoe Neophitou, said: "The feedback from parents, especially those of children with SEND, reflects the dedication of our staff and the strength of our provision. We remain committed to ensuring every child feels valued, supported and able to thrive whether in mainstream, or as part of our SEND Unit."

I am looking forward to seeing the new SEND units continuing to go from strength to strength in making a difference in supporting children and families across the borough. This investment into SEND education will also offer the opportunity of better outcomes for children who are able to have a school place to meet their individual needs closer to home.

in colour as the trees begin their winter sleep, though the downside is all the sweeping up too, though if you remove fallen leaves from lawns and borders and put them in a separate compost bin or even a black bin liner, they make good leaf mould. Yes, there are still things to do before the really bad weather takes hold.

Again, you could plant tulip bulbs, just select bulbs with different flowering times to prolong the flowering season, flowers in March and early April plant bulbs of the Kaufmanniana. Fosteriana and Greigii groups, but for flowers in April to early May try Swan hybrids and Parrot Tulips and for late May there are Rembrandt and multi flowering types. Now you need to cut back any herbaceous perennials except Penstemon which should be left so the stems protect the crown of the plant. It is also still a good time to lift and divide perennials that look overcrowded too. Let's not forget the lawn, if the weather is very mild and the grass is still growing you can cut it with the mower blades set at least 1½ inch high and while you're at it when putting the mower away for the final time give it a good clean and spray oil on any moving parts.

Our veg patch should not be overlooked, if the ground is not frozen or waterlogged, plant new cane, bush and fruit trees, not forgetting to mulch them too. Do not leave any rotten fruit to lay on the ground around fruit trees or bushes as they will carry infection on to next year and talking of infections if not already done put grease bands round both the trunk and stakes of fruit trees to prevent female moths climbing the trees and laying their eggs. On to the winter veg, you will need to remove any yellowing leaves from Brussel sprouts and stake if they look vulnerable to falling over, then snap the leaves on cauliflowers and bend them over the curd to protect them. Now if you have a vacant patch in the vegetable garden dig it over, weeding and incorporating well-rotted manure as you go.

But there are sights to see as well, there are some amazing colours on display alongside the Pampas grass, tall grass with even taller plumes called Cortaderia Selloana. Then we have Honeysuckle with creamy white sweet smelling flowers, Lonicera Fragrantissima. But by far the most striking is Callicarpa, this is a shrub with beautiful bright purple

# Book your winter vaccine(s) if you haven't already

As winter approaches, I'm urging everyone eligible to get their flu, COVID-19 and RSV vaccines.

The NHS is offering free flu jabs to people aged 65 and over, pregnant women, children aged 2 to 16, and those with certain health conditions. The COVID-19 vaccine is available to people aged 75 and over, care home residents, and anyone with a weakened immune system.

This year, the NHS is also offering the RSV vaccine to help protect against respiratory syncytial virus, which can be particularly dangerous for older adults and newborns. It's available to people aged 75 to 79, those who turned 80 after 1 September 2024, and pregnant women from 28 weeks onwards. Pregnant women are also encouraged to have the whooping cough (pertussis) vaccine, which is usually offered between 16 and 20 weeks of pregnancy, to protect your baby from whooping cough during their first few weeks of life.



Good health is one of the greatest gifts we can give ourselves and our loved ones. Taking simple steps like getting vaccinated not only protects you but also helps prevent the spread of illness in our communities. By staying well, we can keep our NHS strong, protect the most vulnerable, and enjoy the season with peace of mind.

November in 2025, which is a national opportunity to remember the service and sacrifice of all those

that have defended our freedoms and protected our way of life. The main symbol of Remembrance is the poppy.

The poppy is the enduring symbol of remembrance of the First World War. It is strongly linked with Armistice Day (IIth November), but the poppy's origin as a popular symbol of remembrance lies in the landscapes of the First World War.

Poppies were a common sight, especially on the Western Front. They flourished in the soil churned up by

the fighting and shelling. The flower provided Canadian doctor John McCrae with inspiration for his poem 'In Flanders Fields', which he wrote whilst serving in Ypres in 1915. It was first published in Punch, having been rejected by The Spectator. In 1918, in response to McCrae's poem. American humanitarian



Moina Michael wrote 'And now the Torch and Poppy Red, we wear in honour of our dead.". She campaigned to make the poppy a symbol of remembrance of those

who had died in the war.

Artificial poppies were first sold in Britain in 1921 to raise money for the Earl Haig Fund in support of ex-servicemen and the families of those who had died in the conflict. They were supplied by Anna Guérin, who had been manufacturing the flowers in France to raise money for war orphans. Selling poppies proved so popular that in 1922 the British Legion founded a factory – staffed by disabled ex-servicemen – to produce

its own. It continues to do so today.

All of the parts of our poppies can be recycled. After Armistice Day you can recycle your poppy at any Sainsbury's supermarket. There are also a variety of enamel poppy pins that you can wear instead of

a paper poppy. Wearing a poppy is a show of support for the service and sacrifice of our Armed Forces, veterans and their families.

The hardest thing in having a pet is the time when you have to say goodbye due to illness or old age or if there is an accident.

However tough, if you have to make the decision yourself it must be in the best interests for your pet no matter how heartbreaking that may be. Try to focus on the parts you can control. For example, you can ask your vet to come to your home, so that your pet may be more comfortable. You can also think about where your pet's resting place will be, and if they'll be buried or cremated after they've passed on.

Grieving a pet can be similar to mourning the loss of a family member. Some owners experience feelings of deep loneliness and isolation. Please don't worry or feel ashamed, these emotions are perfectly normal. Some people may not understand the intense feelings of sadness you may feel after losing a pet, but please remember there are people out there who understand. Talk to friends and family to share cherished memories you have with your pet.

Losing a pet can be very hard for children. Often, it will be their first experience of death and it can be difficult for them to understand what's happened to their friend.

It's best to be honest. Try not to use phrases like 'put to sleep' - this can be confusing, especially for younger children. They might think their pet is resting and will come back soon. It's also best not to tell them your pet has been 'rehomed' or 'gone to live somewhere else'. Your child might think it's their fault your pet is gone or hope that they come back again.

Younger children may not have much understanding of death but will miss their pet being around. They might ask you where the pet has gone and will be aware when you're



upset at the loss.

Older children will have more of an understanding. They might ask you questions like 'will my other pets be lonely?', 'what's happened to him now?' These questions might be hard for you when you're upset but it's important to answer them as openly and honestly as you

Don't rush to get a new pet. It might feel like that will help you and your children cope with their loss, but it can also delay the healing process or even trigger other confusing emotions. It's better to wait until the whole family is ready and excited to welcome another four-legged friend.

The Blue Cross also offer a pet bereavement service providing free, confidential support to anyone affected by losing of

Cats Protection have a confidential phone line called Paws to Listen, a service for any cat owner suffering grief or bereavement of a beloved pet.

For equine support, The British Horse Society's 'Friends at the End' is designed to make sure that no horse owner faces losing their companion alone.

For more online support for pet owners on this matter, the Animal Welfare Foundation and World Horse Welfare both share some good advice on : saying goodbye too.
