# Train Tameside 500 launch to boost local employment and training

# Standing on the shoulders of giants

Last weekend,
I watched a
Netflix interview
with Jane Goodall —
the primatologist and
anthropologist renowned
for her groundbreaking
study of chimpanzees in
the wild. I have to admit,
it was one of the most
moving interviews I've
ever seen.

Recorded with the understanding that it would only be aired after her death, Jane had the rare freedom to say whatever she wanted, without ever facing the repercussions. What struck me most was her extraordinary ability to share her perspective through storytelling. She told these stories so beautifully that I was completely mesmerised, seeing the world through an entirely different lens.

In fact, I ended up watching the interview again a few hours later to make sure I hadn't missed anything important. I learnt a great deal from it — but most importantly, she reinforced beliefs I've held dearly for decades: the importance of having a purpose beyond oneself and the enduring value of hard work.

She also reminded me of the power of relationships and the importance of striving to leave the world just a little better than we found it. Jane had an uncanny ability to weave science with spirituality, and she created a shift inside me that's difficult to explain. People like her are rare — and perhaps that's why they are so deeply admired. They give you hope, while others remain

apathetic to the challenges of the world.

I hope you get a chance to watch the interview — it's truly worth an hour of your time.

# GAME ON FOR BOBBY







Since February 2024
About Tameside has featured a video game review every month courtesy of Ashton based Bobby Kent. We thought we'd learn more about the games guru and asked him to tell us a little about himself.

I'm a 27-year-old writer and gamer, disabled and all three of those have kind of influenced my enjoyment of both writing and playing video games. My disability is the reason I like games so much and it's

good to explore

the accessibility

I can have in

games.

What was the first game you ever played and how has the industry changed?

The first game was Spyro the Dragon on PlayStation One and I used to play it with my sisters to the finish and then we'd go back and play it all again. There's been some really major changes to the gaming industry and of course the one affecting me has been accessibility. Games used to have no options whatsoever with the only option initially asking if you wanted subtitles. If you have a mobility condition you have requirements like

change buttons to use to change the buttons what they do or

what action they perform. That is now a major feature in gaming where you have an accessibility menu to customize most things.

What have been the surprise game hits in recent years?

Animal Crossing: New Horizons, that was released right after Covid started and prior it had been quite a niche game but it grew in popularity.

So where do you spend most time in Tameside?

Well because it's all based on transport with tram or train I am mostly around Ashton, I love going to Ashton Market and getting a coffee from Market Grounds. I also like Rewind Collectibles in the town which was one of my favorite places growing up and still is.

How do you choose which game to recommend to readers of the magazine?

Firstly, I check out game release dates for that month and I go through them to decide what I would recommend to a broad audience. So, I'm looking for something that would appeal to everyone, not just a hardcore shooter game."

Your own favourite game to play?

The Witcher 3, it's a really epic medieval, fantasy, magical story about two dimensions

the one we live in and

the dimension magic comes from. Every thousand years the dimensions overlap and the magic seeps through into the real world

and with-it extensional threats to reality. So, you're on a big mission hunting monsters, in combat, taking on quests, story decisions so it's just great fun.

Apart from raising funds through collecting and donations from venues like shopping centres or libraries the group have also created and been involved in a number of displays over the years.

The biggest of these lasted a few years at the Spaceport attraction in Merseyside which gave the group a large upper floor to display their Doctor Who items. Over the period of the display the group refreshed exhibits and brought in other things apart from Doctor Who like Batman and The Joker. There were also regular appearances of their characters in costume to add interest to visitors when the volunteers were able to attend.

In 2011 Hyde Fundraisers utilized the newly created moon grotto at Ladysmith Shopping Centre for several displays through the year featuring Doctor Who and other Sci Fi characters. Lakeside Shopping Centre in Doncaster was also another host for a one day display and in Runcorn there was a Dr Who themed display at Runcorn Shopping City that took place over several months!

They also had weekend displays at the Cambridge Science Festival in 2008 and 2011 with a variety of characters on display along with live sculpting demonstrations. There has also been pop up displays at the National Space Centre in Leicester for their Science of the Timelord events since 2006, the last of which was at the end of September 2024.

The National Science and Media Museum in Bradford hosted a weekend exhibition back in 2018 and they have also occasionally displayed items at some of the events the group attends.

In 2025 group member Derek Handley invited them to be involved in the unofficial Doctor Who exhibition at Peterborough Museum. The Adventures in Time exhibition started on May 3rd and was opened by former Dr Who assistant and Blue Peter presenter Peter Purves. It proved to be a hugely successful exhibition with other contributions from Mat Irvine, Robert Allsopp and Stephen Mansfield. Sadly the display came to an end on November 2nd but the group were rightly proud of their contribution.

Currently Ladysmith Shopping Centre is hosting Dalek Sec and the groups Batman display for a limited time as things start to wind down for the groups anniversary celebrations.





# The A to Z of Income Tax

Income tax in the UK can be complex, but understanding the basics helps you save money and stay compliant.

### A is for Allowances

Your personal allowance is the income you can earn before paying tax. It's reduced if you earn over £100,000. Other allowances include Marriage Allowance, personal savings allowance, and dividend allowance.

### B is for Bands

Income is split into basic, higher, and additional rate bands. You only pay the higher rates of tax on income above the basic threshold, not your entire earnings.



### C is for CIS

The Construction Industry Scheme affects how sub-contractors are taxed. Registered construction workers have 20% deducted; unregistered ones face 30%. Head contractors pass this to HMRC as a tax prepayment.



"A LOSS NO VICTORY CAN REPLACE"

This second part of our feature of Mr and Mrs George Stanley of Atkin Street. He was just 18, had on some of the Men and

on some of the Men and
Women with Connections to
Dukinfield who gave their lives
in W.W.2.

104 men and 2 women, 82 of whom are listed on the main memorial in Dukinfield, on Chapel Hill, were killed in action or died of their wounds between 1939 and 1945. I in 3 were under the age of 22. All the Services are represented, Army, Royal Navy, RAF, as well as the Merchant Navy and the A. T. S.

Thomas Lawton Moseley, Wing Commander 228 squadron died in the Sunderland aircraft crash which killed all but I of the 15 men crew, which also included the then Duke of Kent. There are several theories as to why this crash occurred, but the official version is crew error. Moseley's mother's family were from Dukinfield, and he had visited many times as a boy.

Merchant Seaman, Raymond Cooper died on August 16th, 1944, when his ship, S.S. Empire Lancer, was torpedoed off Africa. He had lived on Chapel Street and attended St Mark's and Crescent Rd schools. He was an engineer at Massey's engineering in Openshaw.

Private Cora Richardson 21 was serving in the Auxiliary Territorial Service when she died in 1941. The A.T.S. had a vital role in supporting the men in combat and paved the way for the future W.R.A.C. Her mother and stepfather lived on Park Road.

A civilian firewatcher, Harry Wadsworth died on duty during an air raid in May 1941 and a policeman serving abroad in Palestine, Harold Harrison, was killed in a rebel attack in October 1941.

There were 12 accidental deaths; because of duty being performed, in this country, in the preparation for active service or because of air raids.

The first Dukinfield young man to die was Private Thomas Stanley, on Oct 10th, 1939. He was the son

of Mr and Mrs George Stanley of Atkin Street. He was just 18, had joined the territorials in 1939 and was sadly killed in a lorry crash, during a training exercise, on Lees Road, Ashton.

He is buried in Dukinfield cemetery along with 12 other casualties of the 1929-45 world war.

Many more are buried near to where they fell, in other campaigns of the war, abroad. hey lie in 36 different war grave cemeteries throughout Europe and Asia.

One such was husband and father of a two year old son, Robert Walsh, aged 25, of St Marks St. He was a rifleman in the first battalion, King's Royal Rifle Corps. and died 14th February 1945. He rests in Ravenna War Cemetery, Italy.

For 20 men there is no known grave. Their name, at least, is recorded on memorials in Britain, Europe and the Far East.

On the Singapore memorial there is the name of a regular soldier, Captain George Heathcote M.B.E. with a previous WW1 distinguished service record. He enlisted again, at the outbreak of the 2nd World War, in the Royal Army Service Corps and was last heard of at the fall of Singapore, in 1942.

All these men and women and the others recorded as having connections to this town answered their country's call and we remember them with gratitude 80 years on.

# Lancashire Flot Pot

### **Ingredients**

This month's recipe is courtesy of the Tameside (hef -Student chefs producing fine food <u>atamesidecollege</u> as part of their education.

### HOT POT

- · 500g stewing lamb
- seasoning
- · 400g sliced potatoes
- · 100g diced onions
- 100g diced carrots
- · 100g diced celery
- 25g butter25gm flour
- · 50g tomato puree
- · I litre lamb brown stock
- 25g butter
- chopped parsley

### Red (abbage

- 300g shredded red cabbage
- 50g butter
- 125ml red wine or vinegar
- · 100g finely diced apple
- · log sugar



### Instructions

### HOT POT

- · Trim the meat and cut into even pieces
- $\operatorname{\mathsf{I}}$   $\cdot$  Fry off the meat and until brown, remove from pan
- · In the same pan brown of the vegetables
- · Add the lamb back in and mix well
- · Add the butter and flour and cook for 2 minutes
- · Add the tomato puree and cook out for 3-4 minutes
- l Add the lamb stock and cook out for I -1 ½ hours until the meat is tender. Place in an earthenware dish
- · Neatly arrange a layer of potato on the top and brush with butter
- (lean edges of the dish and put in oven at 180( for about
  40 minutes, pressing the potatoes down occasionally
- · When cooked, clean the edge of the dish

### Braised Red (abbage

- Melt the butter and add the cabbage and apple, sweat off
   for a few minutes, season
- Add the vinegar/red wine cover with buttered paper and
   a tight fitting lid and place in the oven at 180° (for about
   1 hour or until cooked
- Avoid aluminium or iron as this will discolour the cabbage
- · Reduce any excess liquid and serve

be wrapped up, put away and left until next spring, but there are lots of things that can be done now to help spring be an even better time of year.

Leaves are falling and time to start bagging them up, remember to put holes in the bottom and then find an out of the way place to leave them to break down. Next turn your thoughts to protection, frost and snow can easily kill even hardy plants, time to fleece up and ensure that when the good weather returns your favourite flowers, bushes and herbs are there to greet you. Let us not forget that any tender herbs and small potted plants should really be moved to greenhouses, even the cheaper plastic ones are better than nothing, as it will save you a small fortune in buying new ones, just remember to check them every now and then.

With all that said, there are flowers that love this cold time of year, Cilicica (Winter Aconite) bulbs,

often referred to as 'Winter Aconites' eranthis have butter cup yellow flowers. It thrives in well-drained soil and naturalises very well. Another is Iris unguicularis Despite its delicate looks, this is one tough customer, that's best sited in stony ground at the bottom of a sunny wall. Cut the flower buds and bring them inside to unfurl. It does need full sun, and a starved soil.

It's also the time to start thinking about spring too as gardens never stand still. Do not be mistaken in thinking bulbs such as daffodils, tulips, snowdrops and crocuses can be planted next year. Now is the time to plan your springtime show and this next month is when the planting should be done before the frosts hit.

Lastly, the indoors can have a splash of colour too with the good old deep reds of the Poinsettia and the Christmas cactus with stunning blooms adorning this seasonal favourite.

With good, supportive men who are willing to speak out, challenge harmful attitudes, and help build a community where respect and equality are the norm.

White Ribbon Day on 25 November, is followed by 16 Days of Action. This year's theme, "We Speak Up," urges men to challenge sexist comments and behaviour to reduce domestic abuse and help women and girls feel safe, equal, and respected.

A key focus for this year is supporting female runners, following research by The University of Manchester showing that over two-thirds of women runners in Greater Manchester and Merseyside have faced abuse. Local group East Cheshire Harriers are backing the campaign.

Council licensing officers have also been sharing White Ribbon posters and beer mats with local pubs and clubs during their Operation Nightsafe visits.



Curzon Ashton FC will host an information stand with Bridges Partnership, Tameside's domestic abuse support service. Additional stalls will be at Clarendon shopping centre and Tesco Hattersley, and training sessions will be run for staff and partners.

Together, we can create a Tameside where every woman and girl feels safe, valued, and free to live without fear. But that change starts with us. With men recognising our responsibility, calling out unacceptable behaviour, and standing alongside women in solidarity and action. I encourage everyone to learn more, speak up, and consider becoming a White Ribbon ambassador or champion at www.whiteribbon.org.uk.

When we step forward together, our whole community is empowered to make a real difference.

It is estimated that 6 – 8 million Christmas trees are sold in the UK each year.

A typical 6 to 7 feet high Christmas tree is between 10 and 12 years old. Seed is collected from trees either in the wild or in specially selected seed orchards and sown in a nursery where the seedlings then grow for three to four years. The young plants are then planted by a grower and grown on for a further seven to nine years.

About 80% of the trees sold in the UK are Nordmann Fir, around 10–15% Norway Spruce, and the remainder are made up from the other varieties.

The Carbon Trust say a real Christmas tree has a "much lower" carbon footprint than an artificial tree, particularly if it is disposed of thoughtfully. They state that a natural two-metre Christmas tree without roots, disposed of into landfill generates a carbon footprint of around 16kg of CO2.

Christmas is a wonderful time for us humans, but sometimes we are so caught up in the festivities we forget about the dangers to our pets. There are lots of hazards that can cause major issues for our pets.

Keep chocolate away from dogs and pets throughout the festive season. Chocolate is extremely poisonous to dogs so don't get those chocolate tree decorations!

Tinsel is very dangerous for pets for a number of reasons. Firstly, they can get tangled up in it and even strangle themselves. Secondly, they may be tempted to eat it. Swallowing tinsel can cause major digestive issues and it can even get stuck in their stomach.

Fairy lights present the same dangers as tinsel but there is also a chance of your pet getting electrocuted. Don't let them anywhere near fairy lights and they may be tempted to chew on them.

All those fascinating decorations you put on your tree can be very intriguing to pets. They are in fun shapes and sizes and look like the perfect toys to play with, they are not. Christmas tree decorations are not made for pets and contain harmful things that your pet could swallow. Make sure your decorations are high enough and kept out of reach.

Alcohol is very toxic to dogs. It can cause nausea, vomiting, loss of coordination. disorientation, cardiac arrest. seizures and sometimes even death. Keep an eye on your pets when you are drinking alcohol to make sure they don't try and steal any.

Take care when throwing away cooked meat. Your pet could try and get into



the bins and eat the bones. Cooked bones can be very dangerous to pets as they can splinter and get stuck in their stomach.

Both grapes and raisins are toxic to dogs. Raisins are also in lots of different foods that we eat such as mince pies and Christmas pudding, so avoid giving your dog anything that might contain raisins. Raisins can cause kidney failure in some dogs.

It's so easy to overfeed pets over the festive season thinking we are spoiling them and making them happy. Don't change their diet, stick to what you normally feed them.

Mistletoe and holly are also poisonous for pets. Holly can cause severe gastrointestinal upset and mistletoe can cause mild gastrointestinal irritation. Needles from Christmas trees can also cause issues if swallowed and with natural trees pets may try and drink the water if there is a water tray.

So be alert this Christmas so you, your family and pet will have fun over the festive : period











# ON THE DRIVER'S SIDE

Motoring tips from Guide Bridge MOT & Service

Winter is nearly upon us and the roads are very soon about to become a hazardous place to be and we as drivers need to be prepared so that our car doesn't fail us when we most need it!

We can start now and prepare your car for the winter months ahead. A simple way of remembering what checks you should be carrying out at this time of year is the acronym WARM, it stands for 'Wipers, Antifreeze, Rubber and Maintenance.There is no substitute for regular servicing and we have many service options available but there is lots you can do yourself in preparation.

<mark>lipers – These are an</mark> integral part of winter driving both in the rain and snow. Check them once a week to see if they have become worn or damaged, if they have, replace them. Always leave them in the parked position when not in use, this reduces the risk of them freezing. Top up windscreen washer fluid and treat with suitable additive, whatever you do, don't use ordinary engine antifreeze as this could damage your paintwork!

<mark>Anti-freeze</mark> – Check your coolant levels frequently. Is your anti-freeze the correct strength? Has it been diluted? The actual antifreeze will only cost you a few pounds but a frozen and cracked engine will cost hundreds of pounds to repair! Also check your water cooler reservoir and keep it at a maximum level, if it needs continually topping up, there could be a leak on the system somewhere.

Rubber – Tyres are very important in the winter, horrible wet, snow and ice could make driving a nightmare. We recommend that you have at least 3mm of tread on your tyres for

winter motoring, you can buy a simple tyre depth gauge for a few pounds, if in doubt call into the garage and we will check them for you. People often think that if you reduce the tyre pressure you will get more grip, don't bother, it doesn't work from our experience and it will reduce stability. Consider changing your tyres to winter tyres. We can store your summer one's for you and then change them back in the spring.

maintenance - A well maintained car is less likely to stop you from getting to work on time or stop you from getting the children to school... As I said previously, we can service your car at a reasonable cost. Don't forget an annual MOT is a legal requirement, it's a test to ensure your car is safe on the road but it doesn't maintain your car. We can offer you an enhanced MOT, ask at reception when booking in for more details.

Finally check your lights, make sure all your bulbs are working and that your lenses are clean. During the winter the roads get really mucky and did you know that you could be fined if your number plates are dirty and unreadable? Check your battery, when was it last replaced? Batteries rarely last longer than five years. Replace it before it dies, it could save you a lot of time and inconvenience in the long run.
